Study visit topic:

EU law giving process: EU-institutions, their organisation and tasks

EU law: legislative proposals

Aim:

The judges and prosecutors shall be familiarised with the EU-institutions that are involved in the EU law setting process, in especially the organisation and tasks of the European Commission, the Council of the European Union and the European Parliament. Additionally, the role of the European Anti-Fraud Office (OLAF) shall be explained. Up to date legislative proposals shall serve as examples and – at the same time – shall provide the participants with a deeper knowledge about EU law and its practical legislative impact.

Length: 2.5 days in Brussels

Draft programme:

Monday 4 May 2015 (full day):

Visit to the European Commission

The aim is to introduce participants to the legislative competences and

internal organisation of the European Commission as well as to illustrate its

work to draft legislative proposal. The European а Commission's

competences in the areas of both criminal and civil justice will be highlighted.

Participants will also be introduced with the E-Justice Portal.

Tuesday 5 May 2015:

Morning: Visit at OLAF

The aim of the visit will be to inform participants about the role and functioning

of the OLAF.

Afternoon: Visit to the European Parliament

The aim of the visit will be to familiarize participants with the role and function

of the European Parliament in the law giving process. Participants will attend

a session of the Committee on Civil Liberties, Justice and Home Affairs (LIBE)

of the Parliament and have the opportunity to meet with an MEP, Member of

the LIBE Committee.

Wednesday 6 May 2015 (morning)

Visit at the Council of the European Union

Participants will be introduced with the role and function of the Council in the

law giving process.
